Early Indian Ethnographic Culture Around the 1880s -

Eirik Thorsgard, speaker for the Confederated Tribes of Grande Ronde. will talk about the Native Americans who peopled this valley and how they lived before European contact. In particular, he will be providing information about Wapato Lake and some cultural practices that happened there. Wapato Lake, near Gaston, was the base home for Ki-a-Kuts, headman of the Atfalati Band of the Kalapuyan Tribe who negotiated and reluctantly signed the treaty for his band which relocated the Kalapuvans to the Grand Ronde reservation.

Who Cleared the Land Where You Live?

Indian Meadows

In 1851 Edward Byrom sailed from Boston around the Horn, then up the Columbia and Willamette Rivers to Oregon City where he joined the Oregon Trail pioneers looking for land. He claimed a 160-acre square south of Tualatin, now bordered by Killarney Lane and Ibach St. and spanning Boones Ferry Rd. He married Elizabeth Mosier of Oregon Clty and in 1878 they built the fine 2-story house that still stands on Arikara Street in Tualatin (facing Boones Ferry).

With son Joe he cleared much of the land and farmed. The northern portion was logged but not cleared and reverted over time to woodland and was later rented to the neighboring Ibach family as pasture for their dairy herd. Once, when Joe was checking the rail fence around the pasture, the Ibach bull saw him and ran toward him snorting. Joe crouched behind the fence and inched his way out of sight, knowing the bull could easily leap the fence if he got up and ran.

The woods became a playground for the Ibach and neighboring kids (the bull was normally confined to the dairy barn) with its cleared areas, cow paths, wild hazelnut bushes, and trout-filled Hedges Creek. One open spot had what looked to the youngsters like rows of Indian mounds.

In 1954 Pat and Clare O'Callaghan bought 20 acres of the wooded northern portion and began the community's first housing development called Galway Hills on Killarney Lane. Later, when the area was incorporated and city water became available, the rest of the wooded landscape was developed to become Indian Meadows--possibly very aptly named!
